About Julie Summers...



I'd like to share some highlights of a recent interview I conducted with Julie Summers, author of "Jambusters" and inspiration for the very successful ITV Drama "Home Fires", writes Sandra Green, pictured above (left) with Julie

Julie is a very warm and engaging person - welcoming me into her home in Oxford where she lives with her husband, 3 sons and 2 dogs. She has written a total of 11 books so far. She was born in Clatterbridge on the Wirral and moved to Cuddington as a child where she spent much of her youth. At 17 she went to live in Germany where she became fluent in German. She then returned to the UK to study Art History and German at Bristol, followed soon after with a Masters in Medieval Architecture.

One fascinating insight Julie shared with me was that her Great Uncle was Andrew 'Sandy' Irvine, as in the Everest

explorers Mallory and Irvine. Julie was inspired to find out more and to write a biography of his life. Helped indeed by the discovery of an old trunk in a family attic when most people thought all materials about his life had been destroyed.

Prior to writing Jambusters, Julie had already written a couple of books about the war. One entitled 'When the Children Came Home' - documented life for evacuee children. The second - 'Stranger in the House' - when fathers returned home after the war.

She was then asked by her editor to explore if the WI did anything interesting in the war. And to her surprise there was nothing documented about their role - largely because they were a Pacifist organisation. Motivated by the presence of Edith Jones diary - a Shropshire farmer's wife who documented every day of the war - Julie found her key inspiration to write a powerful book.

As we now know, the book has been turned into "Home Fires" - a very vivid portrayal of life during the war through the eyes of the women left behind. Julie is the Historical Consultant on the production - a role she has relished. Julie shared many interesting facts during our time together and was extremely passionate about the incredibly important role the WI performed. I am sure Julie shares our delight in Bunbury hosting the next series of "Home Fires". And why the interview with Julie?

six week period of consultation, during which the Utility Companies, Housing Developers and many other organisations with an interest in planning were able to provide us with a written response, setting out their views on the plan. Some of the responses were supportive and suggested improvements that could be incorporated into the plan whilst others were extremely disparaging. It is not unusual for Neighbourhood Plans to attract this sort of response, particularly from housing developers, whose plans are often at odds with the plan policies. The Bunbury Neighbourhood Plan allows for small developments of up to 15 houses and we can expect it to be challenged by developers who wish to build larger numbers of houses. In a recent planning appeal where Bloor Homes Ltd were appealing against the decision by Cheshire East to refuse planning permission to build 34 houses on land off School Lane, Bunbury, the emerging Neighbourhood Plan was used in evidence to support the Council's case. The appeal is currently being considered by a planning inspector. All of the responses to the six week consultation process, together with feedback received from Bunbury residents, is being considered by the plan team, and this will shortly lead to some minor amendments to the plan. The amendments will not affect the plan's strategy or change its policies but will provide some supportive improvements and additional evidence to strengthen it. We will let residents know what these amendments are and publish an updated version of the plan on our website (www.bunburynpg.org), prior to submitting it to the Parish Council for approval and finally in a formal submission to Cheshire East Council.



Declining church numbers - is she (God, that is) worried?

In the past two weeks there have been a couple of articles which have caught my eye, which I would like to share, writes Debbie Shears.

The first comes from the new Bishop of Crediton, former nurse Dame Sarah Mullally, writing in the Daily Telegraph.

Declining numbers at services should not necessarily be a cause of despair for churches because people will still "encounter God" without ever taking their place in a pew, says Sarah Mullally. Young people are more likely to hear the Christian message through social media, or in a café, than in a formal church service. Declining numbers is part of a wider social shift in which organisations are seeing declines in formal membership. However there are people who engage with God, but who don't go to church. One example of how the church engages with people outside of formal church is parish nurses who deal with the health needs of an individual but who will also pray with them if asked. The bishop described how she found faith as a teenager but today young people use different routes, such as, church or youth groups, or a café run as a community project and this is what is needed.

The second is from Stephen Tomkins, considering the sex of God, published in the BBC News magazine.

A group in the Church of England is calling for services to address God as "She" as well as "He". The gender (or lack of) of God has been much discussed in the Christian church since the 3rd Century AD. The Catechism of the Catholic church says: "God is neither man nor woman: he is God". Some groups have referred to the Holy Spirit as "She". Gnostic groups believed in both the female and male spirits of God. Tomkins discusses the history of the use of the female gender, which were only occasional until the past 50 years. Since the 1980s new translations of the Bible have used inclusive language. The Methodist church introduced a new service book in 1999 which uses both male and female language for God "Our Father and our Mother". There is also a movement in some parts of Judaism. In 1975 in the US Naomi Janowitz and Margaret Wenig produced a version of the prayer book Siddur Nashim which used female pronouns and images for God. As yet there has been no comparable movement in Islam.

I have two happy healthy children for whom I am truly thankful, even on the days where they test every boundary possible.

luxury. Their children are not helped by the NHS or big global charities as many of their illnesses don't have names. These families love their children unconditionally as we all do but their children need that little bit more help. These parents will have almost exhausted every avenue possible, and are often on the verge of breaking point.



More Than Words helps teach families how to communicate with their children through a special sign language, Makaton, and for those that can't use their hands, they provide specialist equipment to help. The charity that was founded by Paul Hughes in January 2015, inspired by his daughter Gracie who is three and a half years old and has an undiagnosed genetic disorder. Her various medical conditions give her daily challenges and she is unable to speak. Gracie attends a special needs school and staff communicate with her using Makaton sign language. However the NHS do not provide this to families. This is why Paul founded the charity More Than Words, to make a difference as 'Every child deserves a voice'.

They don't get any funding from other sources, they rely on people like me doing daft things and hoping people like you can spare a few pounds. We can really make a difference to families. Joyce Bayliss - local Cheshire girl

Joyce Evelyn was born on 15 November 1919 to parents Tom and Alice Davenport, a younger sister to two brothers Jack and Jo and later - older sister to Phyllis. The family lived in one of the black and white thatched cottages down Peckforton Hall Lane near the Elephant and Castle.

In her early years when war broke out and Peckforton Castle became a home to many refugee children from the cities, Joyce worked at the laundry house just behind their home - washing and cleaning doing what she could for the family and the community. At the tender age of around 14 Joyce worked in the Newsagents at Beeston holding a position of trust taking orders, handling money and practically running the shop most days in the absence of the owners. It was a busy place too, so near to Beeston railway station. Little wonder then that this gave her a strong and steady mind and a set of very useful skills that would set her up for life utilizing her natural gifts in organisation and accounts.

Joyce met husband to be, Wilf, before the war and married him following the outbreak of hostilities in 1941. They lived in a small holding down Tattenhall Lane and had numerous animals in their care which they both looked after. Soon afterwards her son Frank was born and he also assisted with animal management. Again

Joyce used her skills in running the house and looking after the accounts for the 40 odd years they were there.

Following Wilf's passing in 1991 Joyce moved to Castlefields, Tattenhall, where she lived with Frank for a short time eventually moving into her own home at No. 2.

Joyce was a Cheshire girl through and through, never leaving the county, moving around the small communities of Peckforton, Bunbury and Tattenhall throughout. Having being taught some dress making skills as a youngster, by her employer during her time at the Newsagents, she was often to be found making dresses and other clothes and curtains for friends, family and neighbours. She enjoyed cooking and gardening especially in her later years at Castlefields and loved reading and crossword puzzles and enjoyed TV quiz programs like, 'Who wants to be Millionaire' not that she wanted fortune and fame but was just content to answer the questions.

She was wife to Wilf, Mum to Frank, Grand mum to Tracey and Andrew and Great Grand mum to Jennifer, Bethany and Callum. Joyce was a real matriarch, as sharp as one of her dressmaking pins, and as wise as her years.

Keith Bennion - keen collector and football supporter

Keith was born in Middlewich and spent much of his working life in Crewe as a carpenter at Crewe Works. Crewe was the centre of the railway industry, but things changed and at Christmas in 1990 redundancy struck. Along with many others, Keith searched for a job and found one in Winsford as a security guard at Quiksave, but the ill-health which dogged his later life manifested itself and in 1995, a heart attack ended his working career.

Keith and Carole met each through Keith's sister Sandra and married in July 1980 and together they built their family of Katie and Amie

Ill-health forced Keith into something of a sedentary way of life but this did not dull his love of sport. He was an avid supporter of and season ticket holder with Crewe Alexandra. He would watch them play both at home and away games and he will be OK when he gets to heaven for he has his match coat and hat with him, as well as his season ticket.

Keith's sporting interests were not limited to soccer; he would follow most sports with the exception of tennis. He even understood the rules of American football.

Carole and Keith moved to Bunbury and Hurst Close in 2008. He immediately made his mark on the village through the birds he kept. Most would only see the budgerigars, but amongst them were both Bengalese and Zebra finches. They became such an attraction that walkers would often stop to admire them. Keith was also very attached to Pebbles, the Yorkshire terrier.

Keith was particularly attracted to the music of the 1970s and, like most of us of a similar age, knew all the words to the most popular numbers. He also liked collecting things, particularly pocket watches, key rings from football matches, radios and torches.

Keith's life drew to an early closure through the onset of the leukaemia which was diagnosed at the start of this year. But even at the last, Keith maintained his pride in his appearance; whilst waiting for the ambulance which was to take him on what turned out to be his final journey he demanded that Carole give him a shave such that he looked his best.





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
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
