We remembered them...

This Centenary year has inspired the nation to research and to take time to understand and reflect on what those who served at home and on foreign lands did for us in the First World War and subsequent wars.

In **Bunbury** we began this period of reflection by recreating a Drumhead service. Revd Tim and Revd Michael led the service, along with readings from the British Legion and members of Scouting and Guiding. Whistles signaled change and we filed into church for a "Lights on Service." James Walton read out the names of the fallen totaling 50, a silence followed and candles were lit encouraging us to look to the future and pray for peace.

Beeston and Peckforton's tribute started with an exhibition in the Peckforton and Beeston village hall detailing some of the facts relating to the conflict, personal memorabilia and artefacts from our local residents. A play was staged on Saturday written and performed by local people entitled, 'Will we remember them?' This was a graphic and real account of some aspects of recruitment leaving young men confused and frightened. It was really well attended. After the play was a supper and singing to music from the era.

On Remembrance Sunday at **Bunbury**, the Union Standard was raised by representatives of Scouting and Guiding on top of St Boniface church tower led by David Riley. This was a moving and memorable ceremony, a huge honour and one that those present will never forget.

Uniformed organisations including; Scouts, Cubs, Beavers, Guides and Brownies alongside the Royal British Legion, Women's Institute and members of the community then paraded to church behind the Union Flag. After the wreaths were laid we paraded back to the scout hut where some 200 people enjoyed sandwiches and cakes.

At 12.30pm the sound of bells echoed across the nation and bellringers at St Boniface joined in.

On Sunday evening at **Beeston Castle** there was a drumhead service. This was followed by those assembled walking up to the outer keep

of the castle to hear the last post. A two minutes silence followed as red ribbons emulating poppies fluttered overhead. The castle was specially lit and the Air Cadets from 146 Air Squadron performed a wonderful drum display. This brought this special day of remembrance to a close.

James Walton of the British Legion in Bunbury has worked tirelessly over recent years with Amanda Harris and Revd Tim to engage the uniformed organisations and the community's youth to bring remembrance to a level which is accessible to them. The youth of today are the future of remembrance.

What an honour to be a part of such a special community effort to remember those who gave so much.



A year of walking for health

2018 has been another good year for Bunbury's walking for health group. Bunbury is blessed with a network of well-defined footpaths that crisscross the village and the surrounding farmland. These footpaths allow the group to tailor walks that suit the various abilities of those who attend. The walks cater for people who want to keep up their fitness; people recovering



from illness or hospital treatment and those who want to maintain their mobility. Walking in a group not only promotes physical health, but also provides an opportunity to socialise whilst taking in the local scenery.

Typically, 20 or so walkers and leaders take part each week, the numbers varying slightly with the weather and the time of year. Two trips took place during the summer months. The first was to the Dorothy Clive Garden where the trust invited the group for a free visit. The second was to Walnut Farm in Little Budworth where they were the guests of one of the regular walkers. As the year draws to a close, the group is now looking forward to its Christmas walk, which will end as usual in a local hostelry for a light lunch and refreshments.

The walking for health group meets every Wednesday at Bunbury Methodist Church from 10.00 onwards. The walks start at 10.30am and finish at the church with coffee and biscuits. There is no charge and no need for specialist equipment. The group is grateful for the support that they receive from Bunbury Methodist Church, which provides a regular meeting place. A day in the life of...

... DIAL House worker Helen Barrie

My name is Helen Barrie. I work three days a week for DIAL West Cheshire, and two days a week building a business with a colleague; both roles relate to moving people forward in their lives.

My 'Day in the Life of' relates to a day working for DIAL and in particular the project I am engaged in called 'New Leaf'. New Leaf is a project to bring together partners as well as employers to change lives and create opportunities. My current role is as a mentor working with adults by providing one to one support to help them to recognise and to break down their barriers. Each person I meet with has differing needs. My colleague is delivering an introduction to computing. Why computing? Through the media you will have been made aware of the problems that Universal Credits have brought, and one issue is that each person will have to access their benefits online. They therefore need to develop the skills to do so, which is very challenging if you have severe dyslexia or learning difficulties.

The first person I am due to meet comes in. This initial meeting always takes a lot of time; we create a plan of what we can do to support them. As is usual, this includes offering money advice, as so many people receiving benefits are in debt. I make an appointment for them to see an Advisor in DIAL. We also identify that they suffer from severe anxiety and I am able to introduce them to the mental health provider. Their journey begins ... my day continues with its highs and lows. I work with some of the people I have already met. This includes driving someone to the local college to support them to enrol on a course. I stay with someone in Chester CAB to access debt relief support; she has learning difficulties. I introduce someone to my colleague in the CVA regarding volunteer opportunities. I support a colleague as they deal with someone with severe mental health issues. I discuss someone's housing issues with a housing provider; he is under threat of being evicted. Then a high moment, I am contacted by someone I have been mentoring for some time, who has been offered paid employment.

DIAL was set up to improve the lives of disabled people. Its vision, "is a society where disabled people and older people can participate equally as full citizens". DIAL has various services, which include Information and Advice support to claim welfare benefits, Shopmobility, Ability Angels, a Community Café.

Dial West Cheshire's services are primarily delivered by volunteers supported by a small team of paid staff. We are always looking for volunteers.

In 1878 the Truro Gazette reported that there was to be a carol service at Truro Cathedral on Christmas Eve at 10pm. In 1880 this formal service was held in a wooden structure by Bishop Benson, whilst Truro Cathedral was being built and attended by 400 people (rumour has it that he wanted to keep people out of the pubs!)

AC Benson recalled: 'My father arranged from ancient sources a little service for Christmas Eve - nine carols and nine tiny lessons, which were read by various officers of the church, beginning with a chorister and ending, through the different grades, with the Bishop.' Bishop Benson later became the Archbishop of Canterbury and the service was continued in Truro and Canterbury and adapted for other churches. The most well known version of the service is at Kings College Cambridge. The first service was adapted from the original by Eric Milner White and held on Christmas Eve in 1918. Eric had been an army chaplain. He said that the main theme is the development of the loving purposes of God seen 'through the windows and words of the Bible'. Many of those who took part in the first service must have recalled those killed in the Great War when it came to the famous passage 'all those who rejoice with us but on another shore and in a greater light'. For many it is a Christmas Eve tradition.



New plans for school outdoor play area

Early years reception outdoor spaces are an essential part to the overall development of a child. Those first years in the reception class are pivotal to setting the children up to be life long learners with a love and passion to find out more.

Currently at Bunbury school we have a very enthusiastic and committed team of Early years staff who are striving to provide the best possible start for our children. Our provision inside can only be described as outstanding with the quality of teaching to match. However our outdoor provision, which should replicate the standard of indoor provision, needs updating and refurbishing.

With the aid of Pentagon play and Early years specialists we have developed a design which we think is befitting to the needs of our children. Areas for the development of the different parts of the curriculum have been built into our design which has been completed by a softpore and astro-turf floor. Calveley and the Tarporley War Memorial Hospital

This Christmas will be 100 years since the first Christmas following the end of WW1, and next year the Tarporley War Memorial Hospital will be celebrating its centenary, but do you know the connections with Calveley Chapel?

The parish beautiful daughter Chapel at Calveley, which stands in peaceful isolation at the end of a country lane, was once part of a domestic building complex surrounding Calveley Hall, itself located within a 170 acre deer park. Having been converted in 1838 from a threshing barn into a private chapel serving the Hall and the local rural community, the Chapel became daughter Chapel to St Boniface when the great Hall was demolished in 1952.

Calveley Hall was occupied from 1906 by John Julius de Knoop and his family who in 1911, largely at their own expense, remodelled the Chapel much as we see it today.

John and his wife Evelyn had five children, the two youngest daughters being baptised in Calveley Chapel, and at the time of the Census in 1911 it was recorded that Calveley Hall was occupied by 27 members of the family and domestic staff. Life was to change dramatically when war was declared on 4th August 1914 and the following day Nantwich Square was crowded to see soldiers off to war. The first to leave were members of the Cheshire Yeomanry, including many from the Calveley rural community, under the command of Captain de Knoop, (who had been a volunteer member of the Yeomanry since 1902). Sadly many, including John de Knoop, were never to return home.

After several wartime postings and combat, during which he was wounded, Capt de Knoop earned a promotion to Major and was then attached to the Imperial Camel Corps in Egypt. Tragically he was killed in action by sniper fire on 7th August 1916 at el Hod el Bahein Egypt. He was forty years of age. His widow Evelyn de Knoop helped convert both the Hall and Chapel for use as a Red Cross hospital throughout the Great War, and though devastated by her loss, worked tirelessly as the hospital superintendent. Once peace finally came Evelyn was at the forefront of establishing Tarporley War Memorial Hospital in 1919. Evelyn and her children left Calveley Hall in 1920 but in 1937 a new Female Ward and Operating Theatre were added to the hospital as a result of a further substantial bequest from the de Knoop family.

A plaque can still be seen in the board room at Tarporley War Memorial Hospital in memory of J.J. de Knoop and in recognition of the valuable contribution made by the family. In addition there is a memorial plaque to his memory, located beside the altar in Calveley Chapel, that serves as a permanent symbol of the ultimate sacrifices made by so many.

We will remember them."

During his long tenure, Walter has worked tirelessly to ensure our beautiful church building is kept in the best possible structural order (including restorations after vandalism)—not an easy task with such a large and ancient listed building. He has masterminded special projects, including the new windows for the Ridley Chapel to commemorate the millennium and the reordering of the west end of the church, which provided much-needed meeting rooms and lavatory facilities. St Boniface owes Walter huge thanks for his vision, expertise, determination, and commitment.

Co-op's Paul Fox raises money for North West Air Ambulance

Paul Fox, team leader from Bunbury Co-Op, chose to raise money for the NWAA and has achieved £1000 through sponsorship, donations, cake sales and raffles in the past eight weeks. He had to climb The Pepsi Max Big One, the world famous rollercoaster that dominates Blackpool's waterfront, which stands 235 feet high at its highest point. He had to climb the 420 steps to the platform at the top where the



rollercoaster car meets its first descent of the white-knuckle ride. He then had to reach ground level by retracing his steps down the 420 steps.

He said, "I wasn't sure if I was scared of heights before taking this challenge upon myself, but there was only one way to find out. I have only really ever climbed a ladder to clean windows or guttering and obviously been on theme park rides etc. but at no point did I feel scared. The structure moved in the wind. It was amazing to feel the elements and the temperature changes as I climbed up. It was a truly adrenaline-charged and emotional evening, but very rewarding and



climbing in the dark the views were spectacular. There was a great bird's eye view of the famous illuminations.

The original climb was postponed due to storm "Callum" hitting most parts of the UK in October and I was "gutted" that I had to wait a further few weeks, but remained committed and it gave me extra time to raise more money for such a worthy cause. After (pardon the pun) coming down from a high and everything evaluated, I can honestly say that I would do it all over again and can't wait for next year's challenge.



Sky notes for December and January

One of the most distinctive constellations is on view in December and January, Orion the hunter. If you look towards the southeast, you will be able to see his two brightest stars. Betelgeuse marks his left shoulder and Rigel his right foot. Between them you can spot the three stars that make up his belt. If you follow the line of his belt upwards, you will get to Taurus, the Bull. His "eye" is marked by the bright star, Aldebaran. A little further up there is a small misty patch called the Pleiades or Seven Sisters. Keen eyes may be able to make out 6 or 7 stars there. Using a small pair of binoculars will show many more stars in in this star cluster. If you follow the line of Orion's belt downwards (and you'll need to do this later in the evening when Orion is riding higher in the sky) you get to the bright star Sirius. This is the brightest star in the night sky. Sirius is in the constellation of Canis Major, the "Big Dog", one of Orion's hunting dogs. Go back and have a close look at Betelgeuse and Aldebaran. Can you see they are orange in colour? Compare them with

the very white star, Rigel. They are both red giants, some of the largest stars in the galaxy. One day, in many millions of years, our sun will become a red giant.

As you are



looking as these bight constellations, you are seeing them just as the shepherds would have two thousand years ago, when an appearance in the night sky told them about the birth of the baby Jesus in Bethlehem.

A parishioner wished to object to a planning application that had been considered at the October meeting but it was too late for their objection to be taken into consideration. many If you receive a letter, see a notice or become aware of a planning application that you want to comment on at a PC meeting, please check our agenda on the village website or the Village Hall notice board.

The PC received notice from Cheshire East that an 'unrecorded footpath' (one not officially recognised), running off Oak Gardens, was to be closed. This is part of the planning application 16/2010N, to build 15 houses on the land adjacent to Oak Gardens. There is an official footpath, FP14/FP15 that follows almost the same route and this will remain open but will be diverted around the proposed development. Bunbury footpath maps are available at Tillys.

who said they came to the Bunbury event because we still have a bonfire and always hold it on the 5 November. Cheshire East is providing 'New Homes Bonus' funding to improve infrastructure and facilities in areas where new homes are built. A weekend relaxing with family including my inspirational 92-yearold mum, Clare and our wonderful friends popping in for a glass of something bubbly. Perfect.



In Dublin's fair city...

I was scheduled to run the London marathon in April and many of you kindly donated to my charity – Mind. In the event, I missed the event, leaving me feeling I'd wasted all the hard training miles and feeling guilty at taking people's kind donations under false pretences. What got me through those last few miles was undoubtedly the banter and the 'craic' of running with the best that Dublin could offer. At the 22 mile mark, we suddenly noticed a very fit and fresh looking runner walking in the opposite direction wearing his finishers medal. This was not wasted on the assembled multitude of panting runners contemplating the long 6



miles ahead. Sure enough a breathless voice rang out, "Ah now - that's just f****in' cruel". The banter, along with the genuine kindness of all those along the route offering us sweets, cakes and biscuits kept us all going to the end. I dragged myself across the line 5 hours and 34 minutes after starting and rewarded myself with that anticipated Guinness and a vow to never do it again!




