Johnny Gillett has written to tell us that Indigo Moon Theatre's shadow puppets will be visiting his theatre group and Bunbury School in May.



All good things come to an end?

'So that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints' (Ephesians 1,18)

If you've been lucky enough to have had a really wonderful holiday, no doubt someone at the end of the holiday has sighed and said something like 'Well. I suppose all good things have to come to an end'. Then perhaps someone else has interjected 'Well it has been great but I'll be quite glad to be home again.' Although reason no doubt told you that there was plenty to look forward to when you go home, at the end of the holiday, you were so full of the wonderful time you'd had that you couldn't believe that anything so wonderful would happen again. It's true in general that all good things must come to an end but sometimes they're followed by something even better.

The disciples clearly enjoyed travelling around Galilee with Jesus and also enjoyed to the full his friendship and good company. After a while they must have thought to themselves, 'This is as good as it gets'. Then Jesus was crucified and they thought it had all come to an end, but surprise of surprises! They saw him again and eventually they were transformed. They began to see that death was not something to be feared and that death was a gateway to something better. Some forty days later, they experienced the sight of Jesus ascending to heaven. But in the days that followed they tried to convince themselves that Jesus was still out there, somewhere. Later, they did find him! They found him - in their hearts and lives! They discovered that Jesus was indeed alive – in them – giving them all the power they needed to spread his message of love and saving power.

Peter, the tongue-tied fisherman who invariably said the wrong thing, discovered a gift for public speaking. John, the Son of Thunder, who had wanted to call down lightning on his enemies, showed compassion for a lame beggar and found he could help him to walk again. Stephen discovered that he could out-argue the Greekeducated clever-clogs in the synagogue. Philip found he could heal mad people and succeeded in persuading an African man to follow Jesus. Eventually even Saul of Tarsus, the persecutor of the followers of Christ, (later known as Saint Paul), was convinced that Jesus was truly alive, and would be with us for ever if we only have faith in him.

In the time that followed they became more and more convinced that living lives inspired by the indwelling of God's power and love was really 'as good as it gets' – in this life!


St. Judes news

Chips for everyone

Long before Colombus, the natives of the High Andes grew potatoes, which they called batadas. The Spanish conquerers tasted them, liked them and took them - along with gold, slaves and anything else they could lay their hands on - and as a result, by 1570 potatoes were more or less established as an edible vegetable in Spain. The English approached the tubers more cautiously, despite Sir Francis Drake's earnest advertisement in the late 16th century that 'potatoes be the most delicate rootes that may be eaten and doe farre exceed our passeneps (parsnips) or carets'.

The few people who did grow them were probably more intrigued by the plant's reputed aphrodisiac qualities than by its flavour. How the innocent potato gained this sensual reputation is a mystery, but it was passed on to its relative, the tomato, when that plant began to be widely grown in Britain a century later. This was why the Jacobeans and the French called the tomato the 'love apple'.

Potatoes are variously said to have been brought to Ireland by Sir Walter Raleigh or by a storm-driven survivor of the Spanish Armada. Whatever route it came by, the Irish seized eagerly upon the vegetable, finding in it a food source that would flourish in poor soil and a soggy climate. Sustained by the potato, the population multiplied over the next three centuries until the 1840s, when the failure of several crops in succession brought Ireland to starvation and destitution. The cause was potato blight, a disease that devastated the crops of other European countries as well. The effect was less devastating in other countries as they were not so dependent on the single crop. In Ireland the famine killed around a million people and drove many more to emigrate. There are some 300 varieties available today, many now resistant to blight.

Potatoes made their principal entry into England via Ireland and were being grown by Lancashire smallholders in the late 17th century. They and Liverpool seamen evolved lobscouse,

5 minute Chocolate mug cake

Listeners to the Chris Evans show on Radio 2 may have heard this (or something similar) being made "on air" a few weeks ago.

- 4 tablespoons flour
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 egg
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 3 tablespoons oil
- 3 tablespoons chocolate chips (optional)
- a small splash of vanilla extract
- 1 large coffee mug

Add dry ingredients to mug, and mix well. Add the egg and mix thoroughly. Pour in the milk and oil and mix well. Add the chocolate chips (if using) and vanilla extract, and mix again.

Put your mug in the microwave and cook for 3 minutes at 1000 watts. The cake will rise over the top of the mug, but don't be alarmed! Allow to cool a little, and tip out onto a plate if desired.

EAT! (this can serve 2 if you want to feel slightly more virtuous).

And why is this the most dangerous cake recipe in the world? Because now we are all only 5 minutes away from chocolate cake at any time of the day or night! the meat and potato stew whose name, shortened to 'Scouse', has since become the label of every Liverpudlian. Potatoes were soon growing in all the western counties of Britain but as late as the mid 18th century no one would grow potatoes in Hampshire without being paid a subsidy. In the end it was the potato's sheer versatility that won the day but it was left to a Frenchman to point this quality out. He was Antoine-Auguste Parmentier, an 18th century economist and cookery writer, who began a notable public-relations exercise by winding potato flowers in Queen Marie Antoinette's hair, and by giving a dinner of dishes and even coffee made entirely from potatoes. Reassured, the British took to potatoes in earnest and now consume about 15,250 tons a day. Developments in the crop continue to this day. Plant breeders in the USA were, in the mid 1980s, trying to develop a hybrid plant which would produce tomatoes on its stems and potatoes on its roots!

With one voice and one song May we praise your name in joy and thanksgiving, Our ever present Saviour.


